## Free School Meals and Pupil Premium

Pupils who are eligible for free school meals attract additional money for school, even if they do not eat the meals. This funding- commonly known as Pupil Premium funding- now brings in an additional £1,035 per child; last year this totalled approximately £130,000 for the school. This money is essential, allowing us to support learning and provide support for children and families in other ways.

If you may be eligible (please see the criteria below) we would like you to apply. Parents also receive help with uniform, essential school trips and other equipment. As you are aware, school budgets are very tight, and we need your help. If your child / children already receive Free School Meals, there is no need to re-apply. Please use this link to apply:

As a school, we also receive additional money for any students who have parents in the armed services, have ever been in care, adopted or where there is a Special Guardianship Order in place. Experience tells us that parents don't always inform us of this information. Please let us know if this is the case (by email to [office@stalhamhigh.org.uk](mailto:office@stalhamhigh.org.uk))

### Criteria for Free School Meals:

If your child is in Year 3 or above, you must receive one of the following to get benefit-related free school meals:

- **Universal Credit - with an annual earned income of no more than £7,400 after tax**
- **Income Support**
- **Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance**
- **Income-related Employment and Support Allowance**
- **Support under Part 6 of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999**
- **The guaranteed element of Pension Credit**
- **Working Tax Credit run-on (paid for the four weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit)**
- **Child Tax Credit (with no Working Tax Credit) with an annual gross income of no more than £16,190**

You must apply for these free school meals.

## Personal Development Day 3 Year 7 & 8

In July, the Year 7s and 8s took a trip to Cromer for their Coastal Safety PD Day. Our students participated in a variety of talks and workshops.

The RNLI Lifeguards taught us what to do should you get into trouble in the water- don't forget to float like a starfish!

The Police showed us how to use a throw-bag to rescue someone in trouble before setting up a competition to see who could throw the bag the most accurately.

The Lifeboat crew played body-cam footage of real-life rescues to show us just how hard their volunteers work to keep us safe, and how important it is to be careful around water and the coastline.

St John's Ambulance (led by Mr. Hole) taught our students how to do CPR on dummies and how to use a defibrillator.

The Year 8s got to join Mr. Youngs in a coastal sketching workshop in preparation for Geography fieldwork in the upcoming year before stopping to get ice-cream!

Both years represented the school brilliantly and we received many compliments and positive remarks on how well they behaved - excellent job everybody!



## Year 10

On the 10th of July, our Year 10 students visited East Norfolk Sixth Form College for their Personal Development Day. The year was split into groups based on what subject area they were most interested in and they got to experience two different mini lessons. ## Science

It has been a busy and productive term as students have settled into the academic year, working hard and with purpose as they continue their science education.

Four students from across Years 9, 10 and 11 made up our team competing in the Royal Society of Chemistry's 'Top of the Bench' Competition. Our students embraced the challenge and although they did not progress beyond the regional heats, they enjoyed the camaraderie of the team and had a positive experience.

Our Year 10 scientists have completed the test for cellular respiration using their own breath and limewater solution. When carbon dioxide reacts with the chemicals in the limewater, the solution goes cloudy. Students used this to prove that respiration in their own cells is producing carbon dioxide.

The Year 11s' commitment to success shines through in their well-attended revision classes. These sessions serve as a vital platform for students to reinforce their understanding of key scientific concepts, ensuring that they enter their examinations confident and ready to perform at their very best.

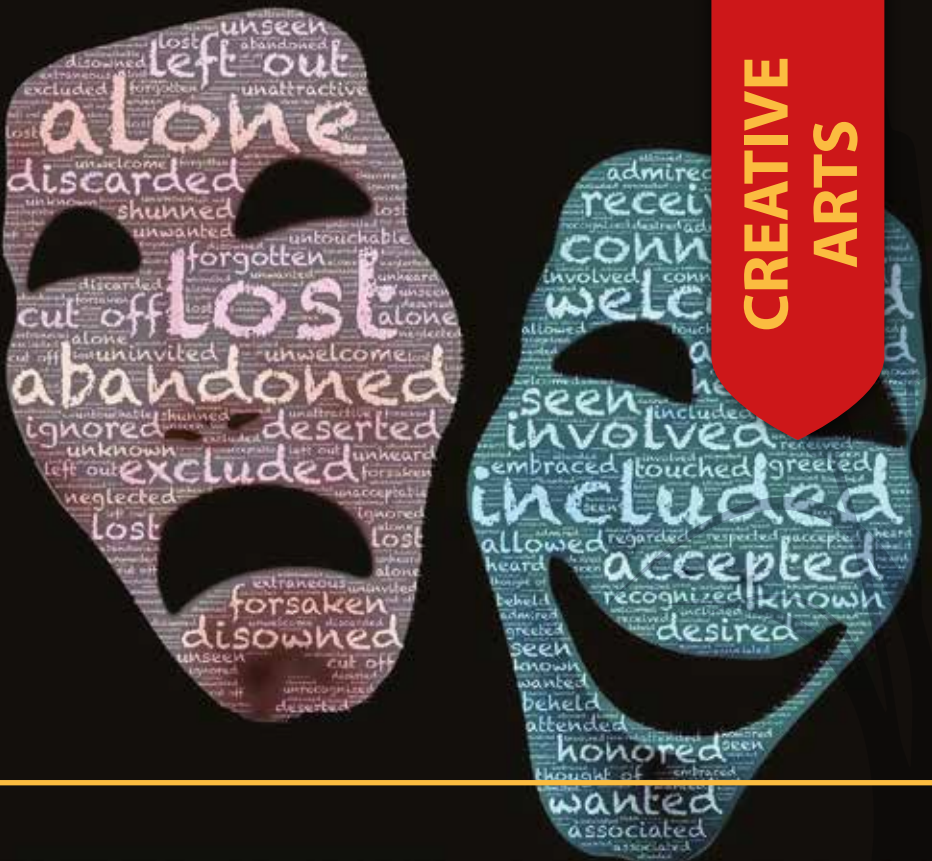

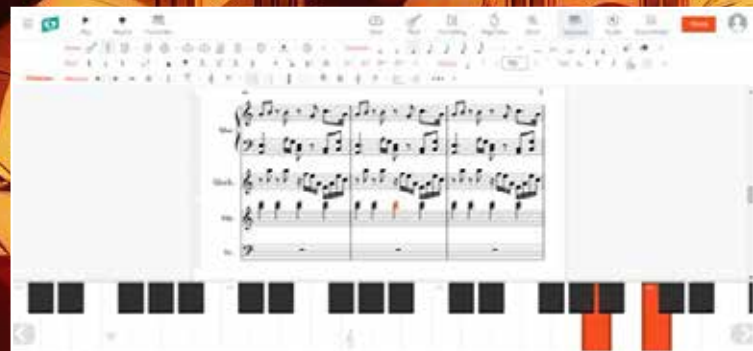
## Composition Projects:

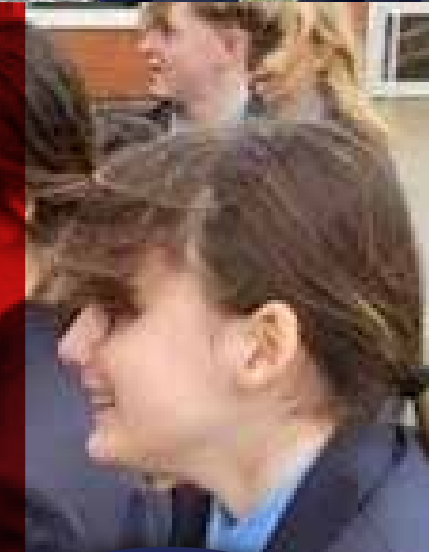


# Battle of Hastings reenactment

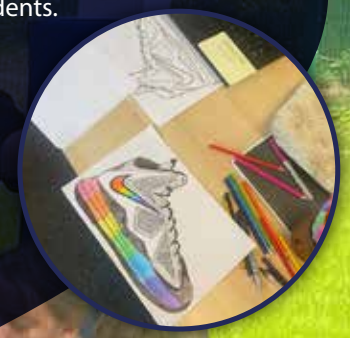
# PAD

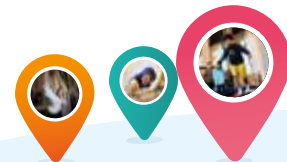
